


Scenic Fairview

By the time this is published, it will be spring! All of our flowering trees are in full bloom, tulips and daffodils are almost done with their blooming season, and leaves are just about out on all of our trees. It is a beautiful time in our Town!

This is also the season of major bird migrations. From early March through mid-June, billions of birds will be migrating from their winter homes north to their summer homes. The DFW area is in one of the largest migratory paths. Most of this migration occurs at night with the birds taking clues from the stars. Artificial lights can confuse the birds, causing them to get lost or run into buildings. A group in Texas called "Lights Out, Texas" is asking that everyone turn off all unnecessary lights outside between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. through June 15. You will notice that even the large buildings in downtown Dallas will be dark during this time. As a community, let's see if we can participate in this effort to make the birds' arduous migration a little safer. This would also enhance Fairview's dark skies during this period, and we will be able to see more stars from our back yards.

Our excellent public schools also are hurting financially. If you have an opportunity to help, you can contribute to the Lovejoy, McKinney or Allen Foundation for Schools.

- April 13: the Community Cleanup event: Report to the east side of Town Hall at 9 a.m. for your assignment. Former Mayor Darion Culbertson, who was known for stopping along the road to pick up trash in our Town, says "Fairview – Keep it country and keep it CLEAN!"
- April 13: Hazardous Waste Collection: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Public Works yard on Greenville.
- April 13: Document shredding: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at our Public Works yard on Greenville.
- April 27: Prescription Drug Take Back: 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Fire Station #1 on Greenville.

I look forward to seeing you at some or all of these events.

This is also the season of fundraising. Many local nonprofits (ACO, Samaritan Inn, Boys and Girls Club, Treasured Vessels, Allen/Fairview Chamber, Shiloh House, various food banks, etc.) hold fundraising events to educate folks about their mission and who they focus on helping. 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












The Sun and Moon are Set to Put on a Show Over Fairview

If the weather is clear, Fairview residents will be in prime position to view the 2024 total eclipse on April 8. The eclipse should be visible in Fairview between approximately 1:40 and 1:45 p.m.

NASA offers these safety recommendations for anyone hoping to catch a glimpse of the rare phenomenon:

- View the sun through eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer during the partial eclipse phases before and after totality.
- You can view the eclipse directly without proper eye protection only when the moon completely obscures the sun's bright face during the brief and spectacular period known as totality. (You'll know it's safe when you can no longer see any part of the sun through eclipse glasses or a solar viewer.)
- As soon as you see even a little bit of the bright sun reappear after totality, immediately put your eclipse glasses back on or use a handheld solar viewer to look at the sun.

Except during the brief total phase of a total solar eclipse, when the moon completely blocks the sun's bright face, it is not safe to look directly at the sun without specialized eye protection for solar viewing.

Viewing any part of the bright sun through a camera lens, binoculars, or a telescope without a special-purpose solar filter secured over the front of the optics will instantly cause severe eye injury.

When watching the partial phases of the solar eclipse directly with your eyes, which happens before and after totality, you must look through safe solar viewing glasses ("eclipse glasses") or a safe handheld solar viewer at all times. Eclipse glasses are NOT regular sunglasses. Regular sunglasses, no matter how dark, are not safe for viewing the Sun. Safe solar viewers are thousands of times darker and

ought to comply with the ISO 12312-2 international standard. NASA does not approve any particular brand of solar viewers.

Always inspect your eclipse glasses or handheld viewer before use; if torn, scratched, or otherwise damaged, discard the device. Always supervise children using solar viewers.

Do not look at the sun through a camera lens, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while wearing eclipse glasses or using a handheld solar viewer. The concentrated solar rays will burn through the filter and cause serious eye injury.

If you don't have eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer, you can use an indirect viewing method, which does not involve looking directly at the sun. One way is to use a pinhole projector, which has a small opening (for example, a hole punched in an index card) and projects an image of the sun onto a nearby surface. With the sun at your back, you can then safely view the projected image. *Do not* look at the sun through the pinhole!

Do not use eclipse glasses or handheld viewers with cameras, binoculars, or telescopes. Those require different types of solar filters. When viewing the partial phases of the eclipse through cameras, binoculars, or telescopes equipped with proper solar filters, you do not need to wear eclipse glasses. (The solar filters do the same job as the eclipse glasses to protect your eyes.)

Seek expert advice from an astronomer before using a solar filter with a camera, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device. Note that solar filters must be attached to the front of any telescope, binoculars, camera lens, or other optics.



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Outdoor Warning Sirens Tested Monthly

Fairview uses an outdoor warning system with pole-mounted sirens to alert people who are outside of the threat of severe weather.

The storm warning siren system is designed to warn people who are outside to seek shelter. It is not intended to audibly warn people who are already indoors.

The system is activated by local public safety authorities based on specific criteria. The Fairview system is activated by the Allen Public Safety dispatchers, as a courtesy to the Town of Fairview. The Fairview and Allen systems are provided by the same manufacturer, so it is very easy for Allen dispatchers to activate our system as they are activating theirs.

Fairview's system can be used for a variety of warning purposes, including shelter-in-place advisories or a request to assist in the search for a lost person, because it is essentially a very powerful public address system.

The Fairview system will be activated when:

- Wind speeds are greater than 70 mph
- There is a threat of large damaging hail
- During severe thunderstorm warnings, where local storm spotters have witnessed lowering/rotating clouds in the immediate area
- There is a tornado warning for the immediate area with or without local storm spotter visual confirmation of lowering/ rotating clouds
- The Fairview Fire Rescue or Police Chief requests activation

You may also hear the audible siren tests when they are performed at noon on the first Wednesday of each month. Tests will not be performed during severe weather events. If Fairview or Allen is experiencing severe weather on a regularly scheduled date for siren testing, please assume the siren is weather-related and seek shelter immediately. Fairview Fire Rescue maintains the outdoor warning system located in Fairview.

With the exception of days with severe weather, outdoor warning sirens will be tested at noon on these dates:

- April 3
- July 3
- October 2

- May 1
- August 7
- November 6

- June 5
- September 4
- December 4

We are open 8:30-5:00 Monday thru Thursday and 8:30-2:00 Friday



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Beginning at about 5 p.m. Sunday, April 7, and continuing for approximately four weeks, all Fairview Fire Department staff and equipment will operate out of Station 1, 510 S. State Highway 5.

Personnel and equipment from Station 2 are being displaced as necessary improvements are made to the Station 2 HVAC system and electrical components.

Emergency response for all areas of Fairview will be handled from Station 1 for the duration of the construction. For questions, please call Fire Administration at 972-886-4233. In an emergency, dial 911.

The Amazing Technology Behind Integrated Circuits

Dr. Howard Tigelaar, author of *How Transistor Area Shrank by 1 Million Fold*, will discuss the amazing story of the development of integrated circuits at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 4. Learn about the



constant stream of incredible inventions that reduced the area of IC chips by half every 3 to 4 years, and the brilliant scientists and engineers who produced those wonders that allowed IC area shrinking.

To Tigelaar, technology is amazing – almost miraculous. Common sense says millions of electronic switches

(transistors) would not fit on silicon chips the size of a thumbnail in our laptops and cell phones.

Tigelaar earned a PhD in physical chemistry from the University of Illinois and was employed at Texas Instruments as a thin film deposition and etch engineer. After transitioning into process integration, he led groups of engineers and technicians that developed manufacturing flows for next-generation integrated circuit chips. Tigelaar is also coauthor on a number of published articles and patents.

Using Wills and Probate Records for Genealogy and Research

Dr. Deborah Liles will discuss the relevance of wills and probate records at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, April 10. These records have proved to be some of the most fascinating documents in genealogy and local research.

The Lecture Circuit Takes on New Meaning at the Library

Liles will not only explain what happens to an individual's property when they die and how that is decided but will also share how delving into probate records provides a fascinating glimpse into the lives of the deceased.

The audience will learn how to locate these bounties of information and apply them to their research. A question-and-answer session will follow the presentation. The audience is invited to bring current or

future research for tips and tricks on how to make their exploration more rewarding.

Liles is an assistant professor and the W. K. Gordon Endowed Chair in Texas History at Tarleton State University. She



is the coeditor of Women in Civil War Texas: Diversity and Dissidence in the Trans-Mississippi, winner of the Liz Carpenter Award for Best Book on the History of Women, and coeditor of African Americans in Central Texas History: From Slavery to Civil Rights. Above all, local history is her passion, especially when it comes to digging through courthouses and archival documents.

Construction Update

The Monarch Park and Apple's Crossing connector trails are both complete and open for use. The Apple's Crossing connector runs parallel to Country Club Road (FM 1378) and links trails in the Apple's Crossing neighborhood with a trail that runs adjacent to Stoddard Road. The Monarch Trail runs through Monarch Park in the Summer Hill Farms neighborhood.

The construction of Fairview Crossing — the extension of FM 1378 at State Highway 5 — is well underway, with the majority of paving work completed in early March. Once utilities are out of the way at SH 5, the tie-in at FM 1378 will be complete. Pending utility conflicts, the project should be complete in May.

Crews are continuing work on the Ridgeview Drive overpass at U.S. 75 and are scheduled to complete that project in June 2024. The City of Allen is currently building Ridgeview Drive on the west side, and the road is scheduled to open soon after the overpass is complete.

Fairview Parkway is under design to be bid out this Spring/early Summer to connect Medical Center Drive in McKinney to the Ridgeview overpass with two of the ultimate four lanes. Collin County is paying for 70 percent of that project.





Construction Underway to Convert HOV Lanes

The Texas Department of Transportation began work in early March to convert the existing high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes between Allen and Interstate 636 (LBJ Freeway) to "Technology Lanes," expanding the lanes for use beyond HOV drivers. Highway lighting will also be replaced throughout the corridor as part of the project.

The first phase of the project started on the southbound side of U.S. 75 near State Highway 121 (Sam Rayburn Tollway) and will progress toward State Highway 190 (President George Bush Turnpike). This phase of the project includes removing pylons separating the southbound HOV lane from other traffic lanes and repairing pavement where large bolts must be removed. Work on this phase is expected to last five months, with lane closures occurring during off-peak traffic.


The ABCs of Weekly Trash and Recycling Collection

Remember these tips to ensure efficient trash and recycling pickup:


- **a. Arrange** carts carefully with handles facing your home, lids open toward the street, and 2 feet of space between carts and other objects.
- **b. Be** punctual by placing carts at the edge of the street no earlier than 5 p.m. the day before collection and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. Roll carts back to your house by 6 a.m. the day after pickup.
- **c.** <u>Close</u> lids without clamping or locking. If your trash cart is full, purchase a pink tag for \$2.14 from the Town. Only bags with Town-issued tags will be collected outside carts (except during bulk pickup week).

Did You Know? Empty cardboard boxes don't have to go to the landfill. If they're clean and dry, they can be cut down and folded flat to fit inside your recycling cart.

Avoid Missed Trash Collections

Republic Services has added more drivers, which allows collection of trash and recycling to occur more efficiently. Because of the change, collection trucks may reach your street earlier than in the past.

Please ensure all trash and recycling carts are at the curb no later than 7 a.m. on scheduled collection days to avoid a missed collection.

Other things to keep in mind:

All trash going to the landfill should be contained inside securely tied plastic bags, and all bags should fit inside your

solid blue cart with the lid closed.

- Pink tags may be purchased from the Town for \$2.14 each and placed on excess bags that don't fit inside your trash cart. Other than during bulk collection weeks, bags sitting outside of carts without a Townissued tag won't be collected.
- Recyclables should be placed loose, without bagging, into recycling carts, which are either solid green or dark blue with a lighter blue lid.
- Clean and dry empty cardboard boxes may be cut down and

- folded flat to fit inside recycling bins.
- Never clamp or lock lids on trash or recycling carts.
- Place carts with handles facing the house and lids opening toward the street or alley.
- Carts must be placed 2 to 3 feet apart and away from objects that may obstruct the pickup arm.
