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MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Hello Fairview!

As I write this, summer is only about half over ... and the intense heat and drought continue. It used to be during the dry and hot summer months we only worried about water consumption. Now we have to include power consumption into our plans.

Water Consumption

Speaking of hot and dry weather, Fairview has exceeded its “take or pay” allocation from the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD). The previous level was set in 2011 and since then we have stayed below that level. In July, 2022, we set a new level of water usage. This has a long term impact in that going forward, the Town will have to purchase at least that amount of water from the NTMWD whether we use it or not.

AT&T Fiber Service

We have been working for years to get AT&T to bring their fiber service to Fairview.... and we are starting to see good progress. As of late July, I believe that AT&T fiber service is available in the following neighborhoods: Apple’s Crossing, Bridlegate, Chamberlain Place, Harbor Oaks, Hart Road and Country Club area, Harper’s Landing, Montecito Estates, Oakwood north of Sloan Creek, Parkside, Red Oak, Remington Park, River Oaks 1, River Oaks 2, Stoddard Farms, Villas in the Park.

AT&T recently had the utility locators out working in the neighborhoods along Greenville. They have shown us a general plan that shows having AT&T fiber service available throughout Fairview with the exception of Heritage Ranch by the end of 2023....so it is coming. AT&T and the Heritage Ranch management are talking about how to bring AT&T into that neighborhood as well.

The Great Resignation

If you follow economic news....you have heard that during the 2020-2021 Covid years, many folks decided to change jobs, change careers, or simply to stop working. It was expected that after the federal stimulus money that went directly to many families stopped that the work force would return to some degree of normalcy. Well that hasn’t happened and there is an enormous problem throughout the country with finding employees. This nationwide trend is hitting our Town and our local school districts hard.

Over many years, our Town has had an extraordinary stable employee base....almost no employee ever left. But since March of this year – the world has turned upside down for our staff. We are losing employees to our larger neighbor cities because they can afford to pay sometimes significantly higher salaries and because these larger cities have larger staffs, our employees have a career path. We have also lost a few folks to private businesses – again where they are able to earn significantly higher incomes.

The challenge for the Town and Council is how to work into our budget a higher salary structure so that we remain somewhat competitive. We also don’t want to end up being a training ground for employees that leave for greener pastures once they get the excellent training that our Town provides for new employees.

We have a salary study/survey underway that we should see in September that will get us information on where our salary structures are relative to our neighboring cities.

2022-2023 Tax Rate

Fairview's current property tax rate is 0.345580. The Town staff and Council have been working together on the next fiscal year budget and are considering a new tax rate of 0.321577 – a reduction of about 7%. Neither the budget or the tax rate are final as I write this on July 29. Further discussions with community input will be held several times during August with the objective of finalizing the budget and tax rate by August 25. If nothing changes between now and then, the impact of the proposed tax rate on an average Fairview homeowner is summarized below.

With the proposed tax rate, Fairview would continue to have the lowest tax rate in this area for a full service town.

I always like to point out the value that we Fairview residents get for about \$170/month – 24x7x365 fire/EMS/police service, water/sewage/trash service, well maintained roads/parks/trails, zoning/enforcement that protects the value of our homes, and a very responsive staff. My homeowner's insurance is \$2720/year or \$227/month.

Speed Limits

School will be starting in early August. Please remember that the speed limit in all of our residential areas is 25 mph.

I hope to see some of you at Fairview Farmers restaurant on the second and fourth Mondays. I get there at 8am. I have enjoyed meeting and visiting with the folks who come and enjoy the excellent food and service with me at our locally owned restaurant. I will not be at the restaurant on September 12 as I will be out of town.

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This Month at the Allen Public Library

Texas Forest Service official addresses diseases of local trees

Known for its stunning greenbelts and tree preservation efforts, Allen's landscape is adorned with large deciduous shade trees with expansive canopies. Don't overlook the small deciduous trees though, because they often have ornamental value that goes beyond the shade offered by the tree canopy.

Providing valuable shade from the torrid summer heat, these trees can be vulnerable to pathogens and diseases. Mike Sills, Regional Urban Forester with the Texas Forest Service, will address such issues such as invasive beetles and oak wilt at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 8, at the Allen Public Library. Sponsored by the Allen Public Library and Parks and Recreation Department, admission to the program is free, and it will be web-cast live on allentx.swagit.com

Mike graduated from Stephen F. Austin State University in 1995 with a B.S. in Forestry and obtained his International Society

of Arboriculture Certified Arborist certification and private pilot license in 1997. During Covid, he received accreditation as a Certified Forester and Board-Certified Master Arborist from the Society of American Foresters and ISA, respectively.

The Karankawa

Karankawa is the name of indigenous people who, for several centuries, controlled a more than 300-mile stretch of the sandy loam Texas Gulf Coast shore from approximately present-day Galveston Bay south to Corpus Christi Bay. Historians long thought the Karankawa people had disappeared. Described as cannibals in school textbooks, their extinction was celebrated because of these alleged behaviors. Tim Seiter will challenge myths regarding cannibalistic behaviors and the notion that they are extinct at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, September 15 at the Allen Public Library.

Mr. Seiter will reveal evidence that documents three major attempts of annihilation led by Athanase de Mézières, Domingo Ca-

bello y Robles, and Nicholas de La Mathe. Because of the fierce resistance that the Karankawan warriors exhibited, the tribe was labeled as loathsome giants or cannibals. Many tribal members accepted the labels of Hispanic, Tejano, American and assimilated into those cultures. Today, a resurgence of the Karankawa tribe is apparent. The Karankawa descendants have a tribal council and two clans—one centered in Corpus Christi and the other in Galveston.

Tim Seiter is a third-year Ph.D. student at the Clements Department of History at Southern Methodist University. His focus is on colonial Texas, and he is currently finishing his book, *Wrangling Pelicans*, which describes life as a presidial soldier in eighteenth-century Spanish Texas.

Jamal Mohamed Band

Enjoy an evening of mesmerizing music from the Jamal Mohamed band at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, September 24, at the Allen Public Library. Admission to the program is

Born in Lebanon, Jamal was raised in the Chicago area where he was exposed to its blues and jazz traditions, as well as the Middle Eastern music he heard at home.

Known for his virtuosity on the doudou, Jamal incorporated innovative jazz and Latin styles with this ancient instrument. He was also one of the founding members of the percussion group Ddrum, the 2010 winner of Drum magazine's award for best percussion group. The group has been featured in two documentaries, one an Emmy award-winning PBS short film that documents their



travels and observations as related to World Percussion.

Jamal serves on the faculty at the Meadows School of the Arts at Southern Methodist University where he teaches percussion and directs the Meadows World Music Ensemble. A founder and director of SMU in Bali, a program that explores the arts and culture of Indonesia, he is also active as a performer with the world music group Mandala and the improvisational group Drum and Wind.

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Alzheimer's & how you can help

ABOUT ALZHEIMER'S

Alzheimer's disease is a type of brain disease. The neurons which are damaged first, are those in parts of the brain responsible for memory, language and thinking. As a result, the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease tend to be memory, language and thinking problems.

Although these symptoms appear to be new to the individual affected, they are thought to begin 20 years or more before the symptoms start. People with mild symptoms may often continue to drive, work and participate in their normal activities, with some help from

family and friends. However, Alzheimer's disease is progressive, getting worse as time passes. Medications temporarily help neurons communicate with each other and in that way help the symptoms for varying lengths of time, but do not cure Alzheimer's. As time

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passes the affected neurons require increased help from family, friends, and caregivers. Usually other symptoms develop, such as mood and personality changes, balance problems, confusion and wandering. Eventually, the neuronal damage of Alzheimer's disease extends to parts of the brain which enable basic bodily functions such as walking and swallowing. Ultimately, the disease is fatal.

Statistics show that people 65 and older survive an average of 4-8 years after diagnosis of Alzheimer's dementia, although some live on for 20 years. Although there are an increasing number of people with early onset Alzheimer's, the greatest risk appears in people 65 and older and includes the multiple factors of age, genetics and family history. Age is the greatest of these three factors. 33.2% of people age 85 and older have Alzheimer's dementia. With the aging of the baby boomer

generation, the United States will see an increased number of people with this destructive disease. Although the number of people living with Alzheimer's dementia tends to be under-reported, in the United States there are currently 6.5 million people 65 and older living with this brain disease. By 2060 the number of over 65 year olds living with Alzheimer's is projected to increase to 13.8 million unless we find a way to slow down and/or cure this heartless disease.

BURN BAN

Effective July 11, 2022, the Town of Fairview has implemented a burn ban. The Collin County Fire Marshal also issued the same burn ban earlier this month for all unincorporated areas of Collin County. This burn ban will remain in place until further notice for all properties within the Town of Fairview.

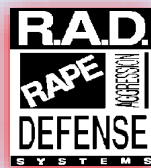
During normal times when a burn ban is not in effect, Fairview has restrictions on open burning but allows for residents on 10+ acres to conduct agricultural burns (with a Town issued permit) and allows for private home barbecue grills and barbecue pits to be used. During this burn ban, only private home-type barbecue grills will be permitted to be used. This ban includes burning of brush and natural vegetation on any land parcel and in any outdoor fire pit or container regardless of size. A propane grill/fire pit is still allowed, as it does not release embers that may spread and cause fires.

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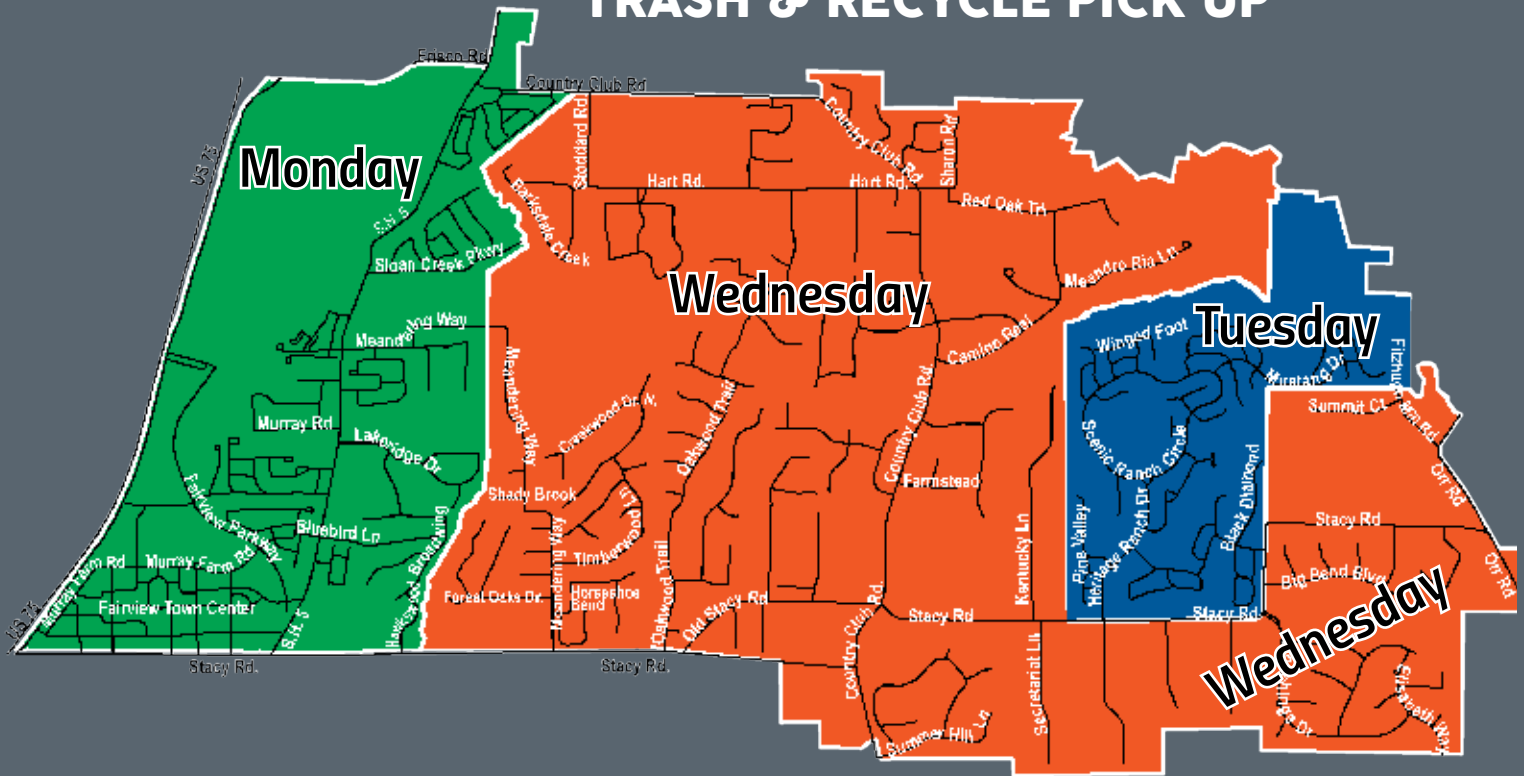

COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please have trash and recycling carts out by 7 a.m.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines on next page for size limits.**

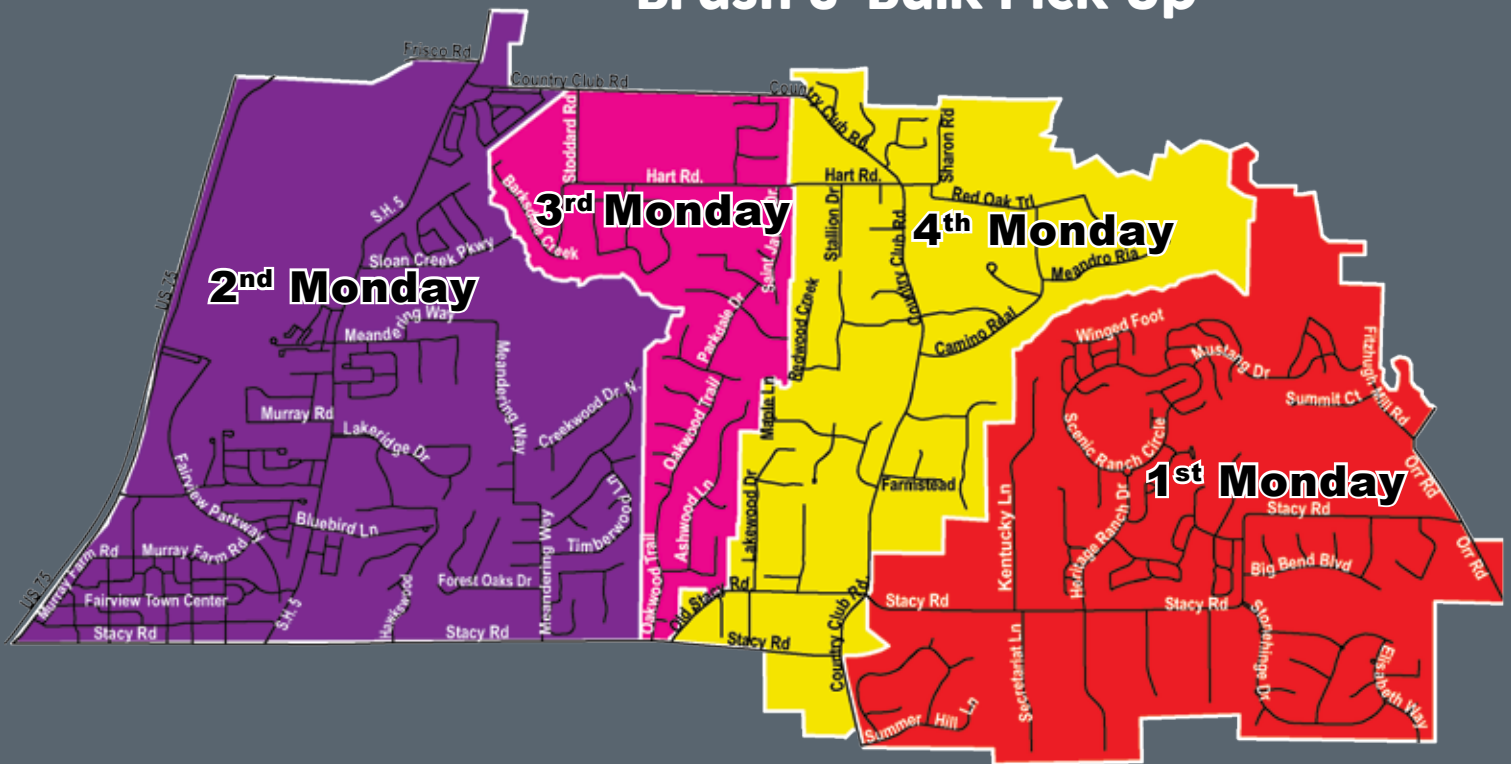

REMEMBER THESE SIMPLE GUIDELINES FOR PUTTING YOUR TRASH OUT

1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
6. Do not place any items outside your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
7. Bulk and brush should be cut in four foot lengths and neatly stacked, you are allowed 12 cubic yards per month, 1 cubic yard is approximately the size of a washing machine.
