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MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Fairview Residents Help Shape the Future of Parks and Trails

n 2019, the Town of Fairview completed a comprehensive Parks Survey to better understand how residents use and value local parks, trails, and recreation amenities. The Town continues to use this survey to determine where the Town should dedicate resources to maximize resident satisfaction. These findings provide valuable insight into how Fairview residents enjoy their parks today and what amenities and improvements they would like to see in the future.

What the Survey Found

Residents expressed a high level of satisfaction with Fairview's current parks and trails—65% said they were pleased with what the Town provides. However, the survey revealed clear priorities for future investment:

- Paved trails and paths were overwhelmingly identified as both the most used and most desired amenity.
- Neighborhood parks and community gardens followed as important secondary priorities, varying slightly by neighborhood zone, age, and length of residency.
- Survey comments reinforced these findings—more than 30% of written responses mentioned trails, sidewalks, or biking opportunities.

The study also showed that many residents use parks and park facilities in nearby Allen and McKinney almost as frequently as Fairview's, suggesting opportunities for the Town to enhance accessibility and expand its trail connections to regional systems. In response to these findings, the Town is collaborating with Collin County and neighboring communities to update the Collin County Regional Trail Master Plan, which aims to strengthen connectivity, support local municipalities, and prioritize future trail development across the region.

Turning Data Into Action

The Parks Board and Town Council continue to use the survey findings as the framework to update the Town's Capital Improvement Plan, Master Park Plan, and Parks, Open Space, and Trail Implementation Plan. This data-driven approach ensures community priorities continue to guide future park and trail investments.

Recent accomplishments include:

- Completion of the Country Club Connector Trail, improving neighborhood access and connectivity.
- Completion of the Monarch Park Trail, providing new opportunities for walking, jogging, and cycling.
- Installation of a "Little Free Library" in Monarch Park, encouraging reading and community engagement.

Building on this momentum, two major planning initiatives are also underway this fiscal year:

- Planning a new trailhead, historical, and park area along Highway
 5, which will celebrate Fairview's heritage while improving public access.
- Designing a new trail connection from Beaver Run Park to Orr Road and Stacy Road, a key link in the community's expanding network of safe, connected walking and biking paths.

Both planning efforts will be completed this fiscal year, setting the stage for future construction and further enhancing Fairview's parks and trails system.

Why It Matters

This study highlights Fairview's commitment to data-driven decision-making and ensuring that citizens' voices directly shape community investments. By aligning the Town's capital planning with residents' priorities, Fairview is building a future that connects neighborhoods, encourages active lifestyles, and strengthens community bonds.

Recently, I attended the 2025 Texas Outdoor Economy Summit, hosted by Fairview Economic Development Manager Dave Quin, CEcD, at Neon Cactus Restaurant. The summit focused on the

vital role of small businesses and entrepreneurship in supporting outdoor recreation and natural spaces. Discussion centered on how communities like Fairview can leverage their natural amenities and trail systems to assist local businesses, promote stewardship, attract visitors, and boost local economic growth.

As one of the report's key recommendations emphasizes, paved trails are more than recreational assets—they are pathways that connect people to where they live, shop, work, and play. The Town's continued investment in trails and parks reflects a long-term vision that values both community wellbeing and economic vitality.



- Approved a change to start the public portion of regular Council meetings to 7:00 p.m.



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
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Delightful Creations on Display at Children's Market

In the vendor booths, you'll find that mythical creatures abound amid displays of hand-poured soaps and delicate jewelry. Some merchants peddle houseplants they've





Small but Mighty Libraries Come to Fairview

ike many avid readers, Ashley Lipe stores an immense library on a small digital device.

"Because I use a Kindle, I haven't been in a bookstore in forever," Lipe said. I would go to the library occasionally, but I mostly was doing things online."

But recently, for creative inspiration, she drove to a Barnes & Noble store and spent time walking the aisles and turning pages made from real paper.

"I was so enamored of holding the books in my hands," Lipe said. "I thought, 'Oh, I've been totally missing out!""

That revelation didn't make her a hardcopy convert - at least not for her personal library. But it did inspire a plan to bring more physical books into Fairview.

"Seeing how bustling it was at Barnes & Noble made me think there has to be this elsewhere, but in a place that's not commercial, a place that's built to build community instead of to build a corporation. And that's how I started thinking and dreaming about a library."

A brick-and-mortar library seemed a bit out of reach, so Lipe started small. In July, she asked the Fairview Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to allow her to install a Little Free Library – a petite kiosk that looks similar to a birdhouse - in Monarch Park, about 1,000 feet from her front door.

The Board agreed, and the Town stepped in to purchase the Little Free Library kit and complete the installation. By early September, Lipe was filling the shelves with books she had purchased at library sales and a few from her family's own collection.

"I felt really honored when the town agreed to provide it," she said. "I'll just steward it."

Lipe plans to curate books and adjust the collection based on seasons. Those who take a book from the Little Free



Library are welcome to bring another book to replace it, but there's no obligation.

"You can take as many books as you wanted," Lipe said. "Theoretically, somebody could clear the whole thing out, and that's OK. Of course, you hope they don't do that, because [you'd hope] they would leave something for other people, but that's where I'm always going to have a stash.

"But usually, people who use libraries like this, they'll have some that they want to rotate out. And so most people are happy to clear their shelves a little bit, because books take up a lot of room in a house, and this lets it get out to their neighbors and keep it fresh at their house."

When Lipe first started researching Little Free Libraries, she was surprised to discover that another one already existed in Fairview, inside Profound Foods in Fairview Town Center. The "Profound Book Bar" was established a year ago by a woman who attends a church that meets inside Profound Foods.

Unable to install a permanent outdoor fixture on a mall sidewalk, Susan Cartwright repurposed a bar cart to become a mobile library that can be rolled outside for public access and then back inside again as necessary.

"Our library has no restrictions on what titles we offer and accept," Cartwright said. "We have a mix of fiction,



non-fiction, adult and children's books. I keep adult books on the 'top shelf.'
... We also keep out bookmarks for anyone to take with them."

Lipe said she has also thought of including bookmarks in the Little Free Library she stewards. She would like to use them to highlight other parks in Fairview.

"When you think about a park, it's a gathering space. And that's what libraries really are, is they are a gathering space in addition to providing books and resources to the community. So it's why I think the park is such a good fit for the library, because it's already a natural gathering place."

She believes Fairview's parks are almost a secret that's too good to keep.

"It can be so easy, with such nice homes and lots here, it can be very easy to not take advantage of our parks, because we almost feel like we have a park in our backyard," Lipe said.

But venturing beyond the backyard can provide a new perspective on the community.

"And, boy, that change of scenery ... makes you feel like you're on vacation," Lipe said.

Much like a good book.

Stepping Beyond the Expected

Ashley Lipe is a creative force invested in building community.

The woman behind Fairview's second Little Free Library also co-founded a monthly gathering for women called "Soulful Saturdays" *and* invented her own holiday – the trademark-pending Befourth of July – a "pre-party for people who'd rather chill than grill."

Soulful Saturdays

Soulful Saturdays started about a year ago after a nonprofit group she was involved with dissolved.

"We wanted to keep a social arm of it going, so I and another woman who were on the leadership board made this spin off," Lipe said.

The group is open to all women in Collin and Dallas counties and is focused on building "meaningful social connections, getting past small talk and into deeper topics."

The women gather every third Saturday of the month and explore a variety of topics and activities, from chilling poolside to learning about death doulas.

"I've really found a lot that people are hungry for a little bit deeper connection, but the world doesn't create a lot of spaces that you can kind of get into deeper conversations or fun conversations or things like that," Lipe said. "You're always catching up on, 'How are the kids doing? How's work?' And sometimes people are hungry to get past that."

"The Befourth reclaims a little summer for ourselves, creating community without pressure or planning. Whether it's on a patio, in a park, or around a kitchen island, the goal is simple: chill vibes, good friends, and zero expectations."







Trash & Recycling Collection Map




Brush & Bulk Collection Map

New Solid Waste Rates in Effect

Republic Services, which provides solid waste services for the Town, has increased the rate it charges residents. Most residents now pay \$23.81 (plus sales tax) per month for collection of trash, recycling and brush/bulk. Residents who receive a senior discount now pay \$22.18 (plus sales tax) per month. The cost for special carryout service for residents who request the service but who do not qualify for disabled carryout service is now \$37.55 (plus sales tax) a month.

The cost for additional carts is now \$9.27 (plus sales tax) per month for standard and disabled carryout service and \$11.61 (plus sales tax) per month for special carryout service.
